Policy Overview & State Update



Quick Background – Clean Lighting

Fluorescent light bulbs still seeing significant sales, contain mercury by design.

- GOAL: Phase out general-purpose fluorescent light bulbs allowing LEDs to take their place
- LEDs are 2X more energy efficient, last 2-3X longer, do not contain mercury
- Large savings on energy, emissions, utility bill, and mercury pollution by switching to LEDs








2022 ASAP/ACEEE Lighting Report



- States may customize to fit any existing mercury laws

2023 State Clean Lighting Policy – Recommended Language


Section 1. Findings

The legislature finds that:

- (a) Mercury is a persistent and toxic pollutant that bioaccumulates in the environment and poses a serious threat to humans, particularly young children, and wildlife.
- (b) Human exposure to mercury can result in nervous system, kidney, and liver damage and impaired childhood development.
- (c) All fluorescent lamps contain mercury and can create an immediate public health and environmental hazard when they accidentally break during installation, use, transportation, storage, recycling, or disposal.
- (d) Light-emitting diode (LED) replacements for fluorescent lamps do not contain mercury.
- (e) LED replacements for fluorescent lamps are widely available for the range of fluorescent lamps used to light businesses and homes and last two to three times longer.

2023 Clean Lighting Model Bill

2022 & 2023 Clean Lighting State Activity



- 7 states adopted (green)
- 7 more introduced (yellow)
- First implementation date approaching
 - Jan 1, 2024 screw-base CFLs




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Health Impacts of Legacy Manufacturing Processes

- Waste and recycling service employees have a multitude of opportunities to encounter fluorescent lamps
- Non-automated collection, material recovery facilities, organics pre-processing, household hazardous waste collection & landfills are primary locations
- Legacy products are fragile and release of contaminants (mercury) is highly probable within operations that are manual and mechanical in nature
- Pathways are topical, respiratory or even vascular if shell of lighting component is compromised
- Mercury exposure can lead to health issues (respiratory, fatigue, headaches and neurological symptoms)
- Safe work environments lead to greater job satisfaction and higher level of employee retention

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Environmental Impacts of Legacy Manufacturing Processes

- Improper management of fluorescent lights can cause introduction of mercury into the surrounding environment
- Pathways include soil, airborne, surface and groundwater contamination, landfill leachate delivered to POTW with subsequent surface water discharge containing trace amounts
- Mercury contamination can persist for decades and cycle it's way through the ecosystem continuously
- Wildlife depending upon aquatic ecosystems for their food source are particularly susceptible
- Inadvertent crushing of fluorescent bulbs can lead to release of mercury into the atmosphere
- Airborne emissions containing mercury become primary means of transmission to the ecosystem



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


What is a Circular Economy?

It is based on three principles:

- 1. Design out waste and pollution
- 2. Keep products and materials in use
- 3. Regenerate natural systems



Decouples economic activity from the consumption of finite resources.





Strategies & Tactics

- Recommendation from the Statewide Recycling Commission!
- Opposition to neutral
 - Exemptions for academia & research, disinfection, suntanning, pharmaceutical product manufacturing or quality control, etc.
 - NEMA: pin-base CFL phase-out extension to 2025


